It was particularly unlucky that I was only weeks into my teaching career when the much-feared inspectors were scheduled to scrutinize the school where I was working. This is how it went:

- The two male inspectors arrived at our school
- They had a mysterious meeting with the principal
- They visited each classroom in the school once in the course of the week
- They didn't ever come into the staffroom, nor did they mix with staff in any way whatsoever
- The school grapevine quickly spread word that the younger of the inspectors was the ever-so-slightly more reasonable option
- I hoped like crazy that the younger inspector would be the one who descended on my junior classroom

On the fourth day of the 'visit', by which time my blood pressure was off the charts and my nerves were like overstretched rubber bands, an inspector finally arrived in my classroom. To my horror I saw that it was the *older* one. He sat at my desk without saying a word and checked every detail in my planning. He also watched me teach. At two points during his visit the inspector called a child up to the desk.

The first child selected was possibly the shyest

child I have ever taught. Over the course of the year I was able to build a special bond with this sweet boy, but he wasn't going to have a bar of talking to a stranger. I strained to hear the conversation, which went something like this:

Inspector (lifting a random coloured pencil out of a container on my desk): What colour is this pencil?

Child: Complete and utter silence, which didn't mean he didn't know the answer, of course, merely that he wasn't prepared to engage with a stranger. At all.

Inspector: Go back to your desk.

I was pretty sure that hadn't gone well. Sometime later in the classroom visit the inspector summoned a second victim. I was somewhat relieved, since this second boy was genuinely gifted: as a *five*-year-old he had bored both the class and myself to tears when delivering a speech on how electricity works, not because it wasn't a good speech, but because it was too technical and complex for any of us to follow.

Inspector: What's the answer to this? (He'd written a basic maths question on a piece of paper).

This boy who thrived on sharing his vast knowledge with anyone who would listen, proceeded to not only answer the question, but to go into a very complicated explanation as to how he'd worked it out and why the answer was in fact what it was. He went on and on and on and on... until the inspector finally interrupted him and told him to return to his work.

When the inspector exited my classroom he left a note on my desk with two comments:

- Teach all of the children their colours they should know them by now
- Don't push them too hard in Maths they are only juniors

I'm not kidding.

For someone just starting her teaching career, the experience was quite disheartening. I was assured by the principal that this was just what inspectors did. They came in, they found at least two things to criticise in every classroom, and they left. His advice was, 'Take no notice of anything they say.'

I'm pleased to say that things have changed markedly over the years. Inspections have turned into reviews, and the process has become far more collaborative and as a result, highly valuable. Next week we welcome the Education Review Office to our school. The team will be led by Ann Northover - I'm fairly certain she won't be arriving in a tweed jacket with corduroy elbow patches!

We look forward to showing ERO through our classrooms where they will speak with teachers, students and whanau, not examine or test them, but have real conversations about their learning.

We welcome the opportunity to celebrate all that makes Helensville School so special and to receive input from these experts in school review. We will combine their external review with the ongoing internal review we continually carry out.

ERO's catch cry is: Ko te Tamaiti te Pūtake o te Kaupapa - The Child - the Heart of the Matter. We couldn't agree more that this is why schools exist: to provide excellent learning for every child, who is indeed at the heart of all we do. At Helensville School, we know what it is to be a learner.




